Macedonian Call February 2023

Perhaps you've heard, as January was wrapping up, that the "Doomsday Clock" advanced 90

seconds to midnight. The "Doomsday Clock," which was created 76 years ago by atomic scientists to warn the world of impending doom is the closest it has ever been to midnight. Midnight, of course, represents an anticipated apocalyptic event that will wipe mankind off the face of the earth. The Bulletin of Atomic Scientists, an organization of scientists and policy experts, are the ones responsible for the hands' movement on the clock. Among the leading reasons why, in their opinion, the clock should move ahead 90 seconds closer to midnight (it has been at 100 sec. to midnight for the past three years) include: Russia's ongoing invasion of Ukraine, biological threats (like the COVID-19 pandemic) and, of course climate change. Rachel Bronson, president and CEO of BAS said, "We are living in a time of unprecedented danger, and the Doomsday Clock time reflects that reality. 90 seconds to midnight is the closest the clock has ever been set to midnight, and it's a decision our experts do not take lightly. The US government, its NATO allies and Ukraine have a multitude of channels for dialogue; we urge leaders to explore all of them to their fullest ability to turn back the clock." The scientists and policy experts are right, we are closer to the apocalypse then we were last year or even a few weeks ago. I'm no atomic scientist—I'm not sure what that is anyway—but I am a student of Scripture. And, biblical prophecy, using vivid language and mysterious imagery, tells us in great detail of coming times of extraordinary and dramatic destruction and devastation. In addition (and this is something I'm sure the BAS doesn't know), the Scriptures also assures those who belong to God through faith in Jesus Christ, that there will be a great deliverance. The Bible at once warns and

encourages us about things to come and instructs us to watch with eager anticipation for their fulfillment. These times will begin with Christ's return for His church. After that, apocalyptic events, much more devastating and destructive than the BAS anticipates, will begin to take place on this planet. All of the suffering and death left in their wake will be beyond the brilliant minds of the BAS to comprehend. But, as terribly painful and catastrophic as those events will be, that's not the end of God's story because Christ will come again first, to defeat Satan and his minions and second, to rule and reign on the earth for one thousand years. So, as intelligent as this small group of atomic scientists and policy experts may be, they literally have no clue when God will put things into motion to wrap it up here—none of us do. However, they should know that no leader anywhere, certainly not in the US government, can turn back the hands on "God's Clock." Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect". Now when we consider the word enemies there is most likely someone we are reminded of. Or maybe even multiple people. Townend gave the following reason for composing this hymn:

"The danger now is that we are so focused on the experience, our worship can become self-seeking and self-serving. When all of our songs are about how we feel and what we need, we're missing the point. There is a wonderful, omnipotent God who deserves our highest praise, and how we feel about it is in many ways irrelevant! I want to encourage the expression of joy, passion, and adoration, but I want those things to be the by-product of focusing on God – I don't want them to become the subject matter. I'm trying to write songs that refer to us as little as possible, and to Him as much as possible!"




