I have followed with great interest the story of 11-month-old Charlie Gard as his parents fought the judicial system in Great Britain, as well as the European court of human rights, to allow their son to be flown to the US for what they believed to be life-saving treatment. Charlie, who suffers from a rare genetic condition called mitochondrial DNA depletion syndrome. Caused by a genetic mutation, it leads to weakened muscles and organ dysfunction. among other symptoms. Recent examination by a US doctor, who specializes in these kinds of illnesses, determined that Charlie has suffered significant loss of brain tissue. He has been on life-support in a London children's hospital since last October. Although Charlie's parents had raised enough money to bring Charlie to the US for treatment British courts and the European court of human rights have refused to allow them to do so. They have overridden Charlie's parents' rights to determine what's best for their own child. The state assumed the role of determining whether this child should live or die. That's appalling and should cause concern for every parent, not only in Great Britain, but also in the US. As I kept up with the plight of Charlie's parents against the strong arm of government, I was reminded of a project I did in a seminary ethic's class, and later presented at a national apologetics conference, on the topic of euthanasia and physician-assisted suicide. Charlie's case fits into the category of "active euthanasia," which is taking deliberate action to end life—the refusal of treatment. Just a few days ago Charlie's parents gave up their desperate attempts to bring Charlie to the US for treatment. They contend that the prolonged court battles added to Charlie's medical complications. Their hope for a cure has been diminished.

When the state is allowed to assign value to a human life, the unborn, the defenseless, the terminally ill, the handicapped and the elderly all citizens are at risk. This kind of thing harkens back to pre-WW2 Germany when the government of Adolf Hitler instituted the program called "Aktion T-4." Killing centers were opened throughout Germany to dispense of what they determined as unwanted and/or useless citizens including: the elderly, senile, mentally handicapped, disabled children, long-stay hospital patients, WW1 amputees, defective children, epileptics and bed-wetters. In this case iudicial and government officials in Great Britain behaved much like the Nazi monster they struggled so valiantly to defeat. The Bible teaches that God is sovereign over life (Dt. 32:39; Ps. 24:1; Acts 17:28), no man has the moral right to kill the innocent (Gn. 9:6; Ex. 20:13) and God is sovereign over death (Job 14:5; Eccl. 3:1-2a; Heb. 9:27a). Pray for Charlie's parents. Pray that our nation, which has already sunk to the low of allowing government sanctioned abortions, will not follow Great Britain by usurping the rights of parents to seek medical treatment for their children.


