Queen Elizabeth II died on September 8, 2022 and was laid to rest on September 19 after a funeral in

Westminster Abbey followed by a committal service in St. George's Chapel at Windsor Castle. She died in Balmoral Castle in the north of Scotland. Her body was regally borne by a motorcade through Scottish towns and villages to Edinburgh, to Holyroodhouse at the end of the Royal Mile. Queen Elizabeth was escorted along the Mile to St. Giles' High Kirk where she lay in state for 24 hours for a public viewing. Some 33,000 people paid their respects. A thanksgiving service was held afterwards, with the opening hymn, "All People That on Earth Do Dwell," sung in response to the words, "Let us worship God." The queen was later flown to London for several days of public viewing before her funeral on September 19.[1] It's reported that 11.4 million people in the US watched her funeral on TV and an estimated 4 billion tuned in throughout the rest of the world. It is said to be the most watched TV event in history. I was able to watch a portion of the Queen's funeral and the procession of her body through London to Buckingham Palace. I was struck by the tremendous crowds that waited in line for hours, in some cases days, just to catch a momentary glimpse of her flag draped coffin. Commentators on the channel I watched repeatedly emphasized the decades long planning that went into this final farewell of the longest reigning monarch in British history. It seems that almost everyone alive during her reign knew the Queen's identity. I mean, when we mentioned "the Queen," we didn't have to follow with "Elizabeth the Second, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and of Her other Realms and Territories Queen, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith. ."[2] At the moment Queen Elizabeth II

closed her eyes in death, her eldest son, Charles, Prince of Wales, shed that royal title and became henceforth known as Charles the Third, by the Grace of God. of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and of His other Realms and Territories King, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith (plus several other official titles). Charles too has been well known throughout his lifetime, but needless to say he won't be as popular as his mother. The succession of the UK's monarchy will seemingly continue for ages to come. King Charles will be succeeded by William, Prince of Wales and then William will be succeeded by his son, George. And on it goes. The history of the UK, as well as the world, may be arranged by the reigns of queens (and kings), or other "rulers of the earth" (presidents or dictators) but one King of kings sees all and takes the measure of their deeds. He is the King to whom all, including kings, queens and rulers of nations, will bow one day, acknowledging His sovereign authority. ~ Pastor Randy



"Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing"

Robert Robinson (1757)

Robert Robinson was what you would call an "unruly child." At only eight years old his father died, and he was raised by his mother. In spite of Robert's intellectual giftedness, he had a penchant for mischief. Robert's mother sent him off for an apprenticeship when he was only 14, but once he got out of the home his life got worse. Instead of working and learning, Robert chose drinking, gambling, and carousing with the wrong crowd. Caught up in his reckless life, Robert and his friends decided to go to an evangelist meeting one night just to heckle the preacher, George Whitfield. Sitting in that meeting, however, Robert felt as if the preacher's words were meant for him alone. He couldn't shake the feeling that God wanted him to surrender his life and serve him. When he was twenty, Robinson gave his life to God and entered the Christian ministry. At the age of 22, he wrote the song 'Come Thou Fount".

Come, Thou Fount of every blessing, Tune my heart to sing Thy grace Streams of mercy, never ceasing, Call for songs of loudest praise. Teach me some melodious sonnet, Sung by flaming tongues above. Praise the mount! I'm fixed upon it, Mount of Thy redeeming love. In the last stanza, Robert had written:

> Prone to wander, Lord, I feel it, Prone to leave the God I love Take my heart, O take and seal it Seal it for thy courts above.

In later years the author was accused of becoming a Unitarian. Had he left the God he loved? A widely-told, but unverifiable, story says that one day as he was riding in a stagecoach a lady asked him what he thought of the hymn she was humming. He responded, "Madam, I am the poor unhappy man who wrote that hymn many years ago, and I would give a thousand worlds, if I had them, to enjoy the feelings I had then." Gently, she replied, "Sir, the 'streams of mercy' are still flowing." He was deeply touched by that. As a result of the encounter, he repented. His fellowship with the Lord was restored through the ministry of his own hymn, and a Christian's willing witness. I love how the Holy Spirit used the author's own words to bring him back into a relationship with God. When we are prone to wander let's remember that God's mercies are never ceasing and He welcomes us back with open arms! ~ Susan Davis
